About the ENTER project

In spite of the European economy's recovery, young people across Europe continue to face high levels of unemployment. In order to face this reality, *“effective training programmes need to be accessible to all young people in order to ensure that they have the necessary skills to apply to a variety of positions in the EU. One of the main priorities of the EU must be to ensure that there are prospects for growth and provide employment to young Europeans”* (EC Vice-president Antonio Tajani, Industry and Entrepreneurship, 2011).

Based on this the ENTER project was designed under the Leonardo da Vinci, Transfer of Innovation European programme. The ENTER project seeks a solution to the needs identified above, by addressing youth unemployment via boosting entrepreneurship and new mindsets in young people, raising awareness of self-employment as a career option.

It was recognised that there are UK and Austrian innovative methodologies and tools that can be utilised and transferred to partner countries. The project will focus on:

- 2 innovative methodologies and tools,
- Equipping VET providers with these methodologies, tools and competences in order for them to be able to educate young unemployed in entrepreneurship learning.

The existing methodologies bring together:

- Enterprise Award (UK) – an innovative curriculum focused on entrepreneurship
- Learn Empowerment (Austria) –an empowerment model

Who is the ENTER project focused on?

This project is focused on the young unemployed who are facing particular difficulties in accessing the labour market.

Who is involved in the ENTER project partnership?

The ENTER project will be implemented between November 2012 and October 2014 by a consortium that consists of 7 partners all of whom have worked on European projects. Each partner has specific expertise in key project areas, have access to young unemployed people and are involved in national and European networks relevant for the ENTER project topics.

Who will be involved in the ENTER project?

The national pilots will directly involve 60 young unemployed and 180 young unemployed will benefit indirectly. It is intended that EA and LE transfer workshops will directly involve 6 VET providers and that 150 VET providers will benefit indirectly. Once this is integrated into the VET systems within each country, more than 3500 VET promoters will be able to freely access the EA and LE.

What will the ENTER project provide?

VET providers will acquire new knowledge, skills and qualifications (during the transfer workshop) to facilitate to young unemployed (during the national pilot) personal development, employability and participation in the European labour market. With the EA and LE knowledge, skills and qualifications, partners and VET providers will have the background to contribute to improvements in quality and innovation in their VET organisations and systems.
