Nyers, P. (2006): Rethinking refugees: beyond states of emergency. Oxford/New York.

This book represents an original approach not only to refugees and asylum seekers, but also to the process of migration in general. The author rewrites the definition of what it means to be a refugee.

The goal of the research was to answer the following questions: Where do the immigrants in the Czech Republic come from and why do they come? How are they integrated into the labour market and in other areas of life in Czech society? How do they live and how do they spend their leisure time?
